Dr. Lowe is an Associate Professor and Principal Investigator of several

National Institutes of Health (NIH) funded research programs. He recently received the John Wymer Distinguished Professorship Award at the Florida Atlantic University, Christine E. Lynn College of Nursing. He has developed models and interventions that are

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designed to reduce substance abuse and other risk-related behaviors among Native American Indian youth. Dr. Lowe developed the Cherokee Self-Reliance Model which is being used in several intervention research projects; it utilizes the traditional Talking Circle format as a major component of this culturally-informed approach. He is the co-author of the Native American Nursing Conceptual Framework which is being integrated into curricula across the nation. Dr. Lowe's pioneering efforts have earned him important accolades in the world community. He is also the Vice Chair of the MFP National Advisory Committee.

Dr. Respress was selected as a 2011 Fellow in the Emerging Scholars Interdisciplinary Network (ESIN) Fellowship Summer Program in Applied Multi-Ethnic Research, June 19 – July 15, 2011, at the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor, MI. This program, sponsored in conjunction with the Inter-University Consortium for Political and Social Research provides Fellows with the unique opportunity to further develop their integrative research skills and gain valuable career advice from leading senior scholars in a collegial setting among other early career scholars.

Dr. Rowser, Director of the Graduate Nursing Program at the University of Southern Indiana College of Nursing & Health Professions, recently received tenure and promotion to Associate Professor, effective August 16, 2011. She is one of the first nurses in the United States to receive dual degrees, Doctorate of Philosophy, PhD, and Doctorate of Nursing Practice, DNP. Despite her extensive administrative responsibilities, Dr. Rowser continues to contribute to nursing science.

Dr. Strickland, a well known trailblazer in the field of nursing, was recently appointed as the Dean for the College of Nursing and Health Sciences, Florida International University (FIU), Miami, FL. She is a former columnist for the Baltimore Sun, and her

writings appeared weekly in the health magazine section of the Morning and Evening Baltimore Sun. Dr. Strickland has won nine "American Journal of Nursing Book of the Year" Awards and is the Founding Editor of the Journal of Nursing Measurement. Her expertise is manifested in her participation on several editorial boards, including Advances in Nursing Science, Research in Nursing and Health, Nursing Outlook, the American Journal of Public Health, and others. She is also one of the founders of the National Institute of Health's (NIH) National Institute for Nursing Research (NINR). Dr. Strickland's dissertation was related to examining the symptoms of expecting fathers; her research gained national attention and was featured in more than 80 newspapers, including the Washington Post and the Chicago Tribune, and more than 1200 radio stations internationally.

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
